Psalm 23 - Notes

Background:

- 1. The author is David.
- 2. Many scholars believe it to have been written while a young man serving as a shepherd. Others, like Coffman, believe it to have been written later in life. Then, perhaps as a warrior fleeing Saul, as a king fleeing Absalom, or in a variety of other situations, recalled the days of his youth as a shepherd.
- 3. It is a strophe psalm. It is a trust psalm. It is a praise psalm.
- 4. Key words in this Psalm: I/me (ni) 13x; Lord (Yahweh) 2x; Restore (swb) 2x.
 - 1. Personal pronouns in NASB (includes understood personal pronouns) = 17.
 - 2. References to God = 12.
 - 3. "The Lord Restores Me!"
 - 4. This psalm is about my relationship with the Lord.
- 5. Some believe the metaphor of shepherd & sheep continues throughout the Psalm. Others believe it to be two metaphors: a shepherd, and a host at a feast. Either way, the point is the same.
- 6. This is likely the most well-known, and most beloved psalm.

VV. 1-3 - THE LORD SHEPHERDS & LEADS

- 1. The Lord personal name of God
 - 1. This is a personal & intimate relationship described
 - 2. The Lord as a shepherd: Many times in Psalms 28, 77, 78, Isaiah 40, Ezekiel 34, Jeremiah, John 10, I peter 2:25.
- 2. My Shepherd The shepherd is EVERYTHING to the sheep!
- 3. Shall not want There were probably times where David could not provide all his sheep needed, but he knew God did not fail!
 - 1. Verb means to lack, to be without, not to have (see 8:5 "be less")
 - 2. English word WANT may make us think all our desires are filled. The idea is kind of like a rhetorical question With this Shepherd, how could I lack anything I need?
 - 3. This is, perhaps, the main point of the psalm the thesis statement, so to speak
 - 4. Note it is shall not
- 4. LIST: He would not want because notice what all his Shepherd does:
 - 1. He makes me lie down in green pastures
 - 1. They only lie down when they are full
 - 2. So, the shepherd has taken care of all their needs
 - 3. Does not mean he forces me to lie down. He has provided enough that he allows me to lie down
 - 2. He leads me beside quiet waters
 - 1. Sheep won't drink from rushing water
 - 3. He restores my soul
 - 1. See Mt. 18 sheep getting lost and needing to be restored was common
 - 2. Perhaps also when fainting and about to perish?
 - 4. He guides me in the paths of righteousness
 - 1. A shepherd is concerned with providing direction for his sheep and a safe journey.
 - 2. There is NOTHING to indicate it is an EASY path (see. v.4)
 - 1. We follow the shepherd where he leads, knowing it may not be easy (Mt.7:13; Psa. 119:105; Jer. 10:23)

3. For His name's sake - The sheep are not dumb animals he does not care about. They are His and he wants to keep them as His.

VV. 4-6 - THE LORD PROTECTS & PROVIDES

- 1. Even...death
 - 1. The good shepherd can lead through the most treacherous paths
 - 2. In Psa. 138 says even in Sheol, God is there. Acts 2 says Jesus was not abandoned to Sheol.
 - 3. Why would a shepherd lead his sheep throw a deep dark valley? Because he knows something is better on the other side. So many times when the going gets tough, we want to abandon God!
- 2. I will...with me
 - 1. Evil is RA = Think of it in this context as harm
 - 2. See Matthew 6:13
- 3. Thy rod ... confort me
 - 1. Rod was a pointed weapon soldiers carried into battle used to defend against those who would attack the sheep.
 - 2. Staff was the tall pole with the hook on the top used to pull a sheep up that had fallen in a crevice, etc. used for discipline and direction
- 4. Prepares...enemies
 - 1. two interpretations:
 - 1. security in the midst of trouble or predators
 - 2. a victory celebration with enemies as captives
- 5. Anointed...oil
 - 1. If talking about sheep, then this is medicine used on injuries to keep bugs out (and this prevent infections)
 - 2. If talking about what God has done for man, could be talking about his selection as king
- 6. Cup overflows
 - 1. Blessings in Abundance
 - 2. See poem "drinking from the saucer because my cup is overflowing"
- 7. Surely...life
 - 1. Two concepts are going to belong to those of God.
 - 1. Goodness carries the idea of good things such as material blessings and prosperity.
 - 2. Lovingkindness which is a key word in the Psalms
 - 1. It is a broad word. Often translated mercy or grace.
 - 2. These two things will follow me I don't have to worry about being shepherd-less
- 8. I will...forever
 - 1. Forever = means go on and on and on and on.
