Psalm 13 - Notes

Background:

- 1. This is a psalm of David.
- 2. Many scholars believe it was written when David was being chased by Saul.
 - 1. Tremper Longman said this psalm is "a cry to God from a soul who has nowhere to turn but to God."
 - 2. Spuregon called it the "How Long Psalm."
- 3. It is a Lament Psalm.
- 4. It is a strophe psalm. Logos breaks it apart into three sections (1–2, 3–4, 5–6). Cloer labels these sections as: "How Long?", "Consider Me!", and "I Will Trust."
- 5. Key words in this Psalm: Lord (Yahweh) 3x; Enemy (oyeb) 2x; Rejoice (gyl) 2x; and Heart (leb) 2x.
 - 1. The Enemy makes my Heart lament; still I will Rejoice in the Lord.

VV. 1-2 - THE COMPLAINT

- 1. Notice verse one's **Climatic Progressive Parallelism**:
 - 1. How Long Will you forget me forever
 - 2. How Long Will you hide your face from me
- 2. Notice verse two's **Climatic Progressive Parallelism**:
 - 1. How Long Counsel in my soul/sorrow in my heart
 - 2. How Long Will my enemy be exalted over me
- 3. The psalmist feels as if everyone is against him.
 - 1. He also feels as if this is because God has completely abandoned him.

VV. 3-4 - THE CALL

- 1. The great would be all the kings of the earth.
 - 1. They will:
 - 1. Give thanks to you
 - 2. Sing of your ways
 - 2. Because:
 - 1. They heard His words.
 - 2. His glory is great.
- 2. Notice the **Inverted Parallelism**:
 - 1. He regards (sees, understands) He knows (notice, learn of)
 - 2. The lowly the haughty

VV. 5-6 - THE COMFORT

- 1. The Lord will take care of me in bad situations
 - 1. Notice the **Synonymous Parallelism**
 - 1. Stretch forth your hand Your right hand
 - 2. Against the wrath of my enemies Will save me
- 2. The Lord will take care of me in good situations
 - 1. He will help me
 - 2. He will show me everlasting lovingkindness
 - 3. So, Lord, do not forsake your works!
